### Themes for Jan. 18, 2017

**Textures:** Texture in photography is all about patterns, colors, and depth. Every detail of texture plays a significant role in the overall perception of the photo. Texture itself can become the subject of an image. Normally, we think of texture as how something feels when we touch it. In a photograph, texture appears to pop out at us as if we could touch it. Strong texture makes the subject in an image stand out. Light raking across the surface of an object highlights its textural details.

**Bridges**: Bridge photography is a favorite for landscape and travel photographers alike. For these shots, you will often be recording a long exposure. For capturing sharp images, a tripod may be necessary, kept low to the ground and stable. The golden hours (sunset and sunrise) are a popular time for shooting. Take plenty of shots because the light changes quickly. Bridge photos work well in color (showing off the sunrise or sunset) or in mono (more moody or atmospheric). Try turning your bridge image into a silhouette against a bright and colorful sky.

# Nov. 16 Eastern State Penitentiary Meetup with Roadrunner Photography - By Lori Saunders

On Sat., Nov., 12, I attended the Eastern State Penitentiary Meetup with Roadrunner Photography tours (http://roadrunnerphotographytours.com) in Philadelphia, PA. The official part of the trip was for exclusive access to the Eastern State Penitentiary from 5:30 to 9:30, where we would do 'light-painting' in all parts of the penitentiary that are ever open to the public. As part of our access, we could also go in early during the regular public day time hours.

The Eastern State Penitentiary, (ESP), is a former prison in Philadelphia's Fairmount section. It was operational from 1829 until 1971. The penitentiary refined the revolutionary system of separate incarceration first pioneered at the Walnut Street Jail which emphasized principles of reform rather than punishment.

Notorious criminals such as Al Capone and bank robber Willie Sutton were held inside its innovative wagon wheel design. At its completion, the building was the largest and most expensive public structure ever erected, and quickly became a model for more than 300 prisons worldwide. The prison is currently a U.S. National Historic Landmark, which is open to the public

as a museum for tours seven days a week, twelve months a year, 10 am to 5 pm.

I arrived on Friday evening so that I could attend a 'light-painting' how to presentation by Don and Denise on Saturday morning. It's a photographic technique in which exposures are made by moving a hand-held light



source while taking a long exposure photograph, either to illuminate a subject or to shine a point of light directly at the camera, or by moving the camera itself during exposure. It is a technique that take a lot of practice!

Following the workshop, I headed over to the Penitentiary for early access since I had never been before. It was quite crowded with the general public as it was a holiday weekend; however, I still managed to get a few shots in and connect with some fellow photographers. At 5:00, we all met out front for the beginning of our exclusive after hours access. From 5:30 to 6:30 the artificial lights were left on, which made for some great shadows and also photographing the cell reportedly occupied by Al Capone that had nice



furniture supplied to him. At 6:30 or so, all lights were turned off and we only had our flash and other lights we had brought with us for illumination. Although we had several hours to photograph in fairly cold conditions, it went by very quickly. Don, Denise, and other more experienced photographers were very helpful to those of us more new to the technique. Nevertheless, it is very time consuming and there was a lot to photograph - even a light saber or two. After we were all done at 9:30, we got pizza across the street, and I am sure it was much better than prison fare.

# Field Trip to Meadowlark Gardens' Winter Walk of Lights: *Tues., Dec.13, 4:45 p.m.*

The garden is allowing our group to have early access to the park (regular access starts at 5:30). Tuesdays should be less crowded than other days of the week. If you have not visited, it really is something to see; every year from mid-November until just after New Year's Day, the garden is transformed into a half-mile, animated walk of lights. This will be a great opportunity to practice your nighttime photography. I have some experience in nighttime photography and will be happy to help out anyone completely new to it. Tripods are strongly encouraged; however, tripods are not allowed to be setup on the trail; you are also not allowed to go out of the Winter Walk area (i.e., across the lake). You need to purchase individual tickets ahead of time (the sooner the better!) online at: novaparks.ticketfly.com. They are \$12 for adults and you will need to select the 5:30 time slot. We will meet at the front of Meadowlark at 4:45 (I will arrive a bit before). It's located at 9750 Meadowlark Gardens Ct, Vienna. Bring:

### **POLAR BEAR SAFARI**

It had long been my wish to go and see these magnificent animals in their natural habitat; this November I and my husband joined a group led by Natural Habitat Adventures to visit the area around Churchill, Manitoba where the white giants congregate in early winter, waiting for the sea ice to form so that they can at last go out and hunt their favorite prey, the seals.



To get to Churchill we flew to Winnipeg, via Chicago, stayed one day and night there, and continued with a small plane to Churchill which sits alone in the vast tundra near the Arctic Circle. There are no roads to Churchill, the only access being by air or by train. The plane takes a little more than two hours. The train takes 36 hours, as it can only go very slowly so as not to melt the permafrost and derail the tracks. In Winnipeg, we had a chance to visit the Assiniboine Zoo and get our first glimpse of polar bears; they have a pool where you walk through a glass tunnel and watch them from below, swimming and chasing fish--a fascinating and otherwise impossible view of the bears.

Arriving in Churchill we took a bus to the outskirts of town where we boarded a Tundra Buggy, a huge ungainly vehicle with 8-foot-high tires, capable of crossing the slippery expanses of ice and snow. They only move at 25 miles per hour, so as to avoid melting the permafrost with their passage. Our first bear sighting was right outside town, a large animal trotting along through the scrub just behind some houses. Residents of Churchill must be constantly on watch for these hungry invaders of their town.

After several hours of exploring the tundra, eating lunch aboard the vehicle, and seeing several bears at a distance, we arrived at the Tundra Lodge. There are only two companies that have a permit for this kind of

accommodation. The lodge is a series of long carriages, rather like a long-distance sleeper car on a train. The four carriages were connected with open grid decks, with a deck at the rear onto which the buggy locked to provide easy passage to the lodge. One never sets foot on the ground.

The first, sleeping, carriage had "bedrooms" on each side of a narrow hallway, with five bathrooms. The "bedroom" was a single bunk, with a small window and a shelf overhead (sometimes below an upper bunk) for luggage, etc. and floor space the length of the bunk about three feet wide. NOT MUCH ROOM to move around. The next carriage was a comfortable lounge with hot drinks always available, and the third a very nice dining room with a kitchen at the end. The last one was for the staff. No phones, no TV, except for showing photos and videos, and no internet. My kind of place for a while!!

Each day we went out on the tundra buggies looking for the great white bears. Since the sea ice had not formed our search turned up plenty of them, mostly lounging on a snow bank to keep cool, or wandering around looking for a possible snack. These animals had not eaten anything substantial since early summer so were probably very hungry. We saw a few mothers with cubs, usually resting, but they were mostly too far away for close up photos. The tundra buggies were like a small sitting room, and each person had a window seat. It was comfortably warm, until one opened the window to photograph and the cold arctic air hit us like an aggressive wake-up call.



Our group was divided into two parties, one going out in the morning and the other in the afternoon. Those that stayed in the lodge were not lacking for action. Several polar bears visited the lodge, sometimes standing up and trying to peer into the windows, sometimes just sitting around in the snow, and occasionally chasing off a visiting rival. We had great views from inside and even better from the open decks between the cars. It was amazing to see these beautiful animals up so close; they never acted aggressively towards their audience, more curious than anything, and often appeared to ignore our presence completely; they were more attracted by the aromas emanating from the kitchen.

Surprisingly, there was little snow, just very cold temperatures. The tundra landscape is stark and forbidding, but nonetheless beautiful, especially in the early hours under a colorful dawn light. One morning, we encountered a pair of large male bears that were apparently traveling together. They wandered along, occasionally pushing each other, like active teenage boys. One of them was considerably larger and seemed to be the leader. After watching them for a while, we were treated to a demonstration of polar bear challenges; they both stood up on their huge hind paws and proceeded to push and bat at each other, biting around the head and ears. Our guide said this was play-fighting but it was a preliminary to the real thing when the bears are ready to find a mate.



Although we found the temperatures very frigid, the bears have such a protective coat that they actively searched for a nice cold snow bank on which to cool off, sometimes digging down to the more frozen section for an even colder resting place. Polar bears are naturally solitary and only congregate around Churchill and other strategic places, waiting for the sea to freeze. There is no fence or

wall preventing them from going into town and there is a 24-hour patrol keeping watch for unwelcome visitors. If the bears are persistent in invading the town, they have huge barrel shaped cages that are baited with seal meat to catch the intruders that are then hauled off to the "polar bear jail" on the edge of town. When we were there, they had 11 such bears in custody; these animals are not fed while encaged. They simply sleep the days away until they are released on Hudson Bay when the sea ice freezes. Feeding them would encourage them to return for a free dinner and they would not be eating anyway if they were left to roam.



Weather in Churchill is at best unpredictable, but we were lucky to have a lot of sunshine and some clear nights when we were treated to a sight of the Aurora Borealis. It was not particularly spectacular but still a wonderful experience to see. Watching the sky with the naked eye did not always reveal the brilliant colors but the camera picks up so much more than the human vision, and the results were often very surprising.

Sadly, global warming is causing the sea ice to freeze later and later and it is changing the hunting, mating and coexisting life cycle of these magnificent creatures. Their numbers have diminished at an alarming rate and who knows what the next quarter century will bring. If you want to see these amazing animals in their natural habitat, don't wait too long. A visit to their cold domain is worth all the effort of getting there.

# AWARD-WINNING MACRO SETUP

Last year at Nature Visions. Mike Moats told me about a photographer, Tom Shahan, who takes pictures of small insects, especially jumping spiders. That conversation led me to emulate his set-up, which he describes on his video at

http://thomasshahan.com/#video.



For the image, "A Fly on Echinacea," I used an old 50mm f/1.4 lens with a manual aperture ring I already owned. A \$10 reversing ring from B and H allowed me to place the lens in reverse on a Nikon d7000. I attached a \$10 Vello straight flash bracket on the bottom of camera with a Nikon SB-700 flash on the other end. A Nikon off camera flash cord triggers the flash. I diffused the flash with a \$17 Westcott Pocketbox mini. I taped on a couple of sheets of paper to add to the diffusion.



The flash is set to manual power and a bit of trial and error is needed to get the right exposure. I focus by moving the camera very close to the subject, just an inch or so away. I move slowly to the insect and often I can get very close and get a shot or two. The chill of early morning is a good time to look for insects that are not moving. For the image below I was able to get a few images at different focal points and then focus stack them in Photoshop manually using layer masks.


