Well I guess I don't have to tell you that 2020 has been quite a year!



SUMMARY OF VPS COMPETITION RULE CHANGES FOR 2020-2021 AND BEYOND

of Digital Entries increased to 4

While we are meeting virtually because of Covid-19, you may submit up to 4 digital images (instead of just 3) on a competition evening, and no more than 2 images in any one category.

New Competition Category—Open Digital Art

We have removed the Digital Art Theme designation, and created a new competition category — **Open Digital Art.** This category is reserved for images that clearly depict "altered reality". They may be of any subject, and should show an obvious change in natural color, form or shape or some combination of all three. Images altered to look like a painting, pencil drawing, or abstract would fit in this category. All images must be original, as well as any incorporated elements, including textures. Original artwork or computer graphics may be incorporated as long as the original photographic content predominates. Images may not be entirely computer generated. Creative digital filters, that manipulate existing photographic pixels to produce effects such as brush strokes and surface texture, are permitted. High Dynamic Range (HDR) images without further changes would **not** be appropriate for this category.

With the Digital Art Category addition, we now have 4 competition categories:

- Open Prints (suspended while meeting virtually)
- Digital Monthly Themes (2 /month)
- Open Digital
- Open Digital Art

All Images Rule – This rule applies to all images, digital or print, submitted in any competition category:

 All photos entered in a competition must be taken by the person submitting the photo. In categories where composites or other digital manipulations, are allowed, all work, including added textures and other elements must be created by the submitter.

For all the "Open" competition categories and all regular themes in the Theme category, the above "All Images Rule" is the only post processing rule. Any software may be used as long as any elements added to the original image are created by the submitter.

New Theme Designation - "Realistic"

The Competition manager may designate any theme for any month as "Realistic". This means the post processing for this theme is limited so the realism of the image is preserved:

Spot removal, contrast and level adjustments, conversion to monochrome, color and saturation adjustments, and cropping are permitted. Focus stacking, HDR composites, stitched panoramas and other procedures that combine multiple images of the same scene are allowed. Combining multiple exposures of a changing scene is not allowed. Minor cloning to remove trash, power lines, etc. is allowed. Other techniques used to remove, rearrange pictorial elements, or add image elements or textures not in the original scene are not allowed.

Spot removal, contrast and level adjustments, conversion to monochrome, color and saturation adjustments are allowed. Focus stacking, HDR composites, stitched panoramas of the same scene are allowed. Combining multiple exposures of a changing scene are **not** allowed.

Minor cloning to remove extraneous elements (trash, telephone wires, etc.) is allowed. Cloning or other techniques that add, relocate, remove, or replace significant pictorial elements are **not** allowed. Techniques that add textures or other elements not appearing in the original scene may **not** be used.

All Other Themes -

Do **not** have the above mentioned restrictions on post processing. The only post processing rule that applies is the <u>All Images Rule</u>: Images submitted to a competition must be taken by the person submitting the image. Significant pictorial elements or textures added to an image must also be created by the person submitting the image.

^{*}Themes with Realistic designation - Images submitted to these themes must have limited post processing so the realistic nature of the photo is enhanced/preserved:

OPN's 15th Annual Photo Contest

We're looking for large, high-impact images that highlight an aspect of optics. All images should be high resolution (at least 2,500 x 3,300 pixels at 72 dpi or 8.5" x 11" at 300 dpi) and the sole work of the submitter or submitters.

Please consider the following for your entries:

- A creative demonstration of an optical principle.
- Any use of optical equipment such as lasers, mirrors or fibers to create an abstract or artistic image.
- An image that is a close-up of a unique or unusual texture, such as a semiconductor chip.
- The use of microscopy to create a compelling image whose subject is not immediately recognizable, or one that looks like something other than what it is.
- A satellite image that captures an alien landscape, or a sweeping new view of one on Earth.
- A telescopic image of distant stars, galaxies, nebulae or other celestial bodies.
- A picture that captures atmospheric optics or optics in the natural world—for example, a rainbow, an aurora, the reflection off of a lake.

The Alexia Grants

The Alexia Grant competition will begin accepting applications on Sept. 14, 2020.

The deadline is Oct. 5, 2020.

The Alexia has for 30 years given grants to student and professional visual journalists to help them produce projects that inspire change by addressing topics that are socially significant.

We are changing the parameters and expectations for this year's competition, given how the pandemic is affecting those in the visual storytelling profession. We are reducing the entry fee from \$50 to \$20 and the grant money may be spent on whatever the recipient deems to be most necessary, as opposed to expecting it to go toward producing a proposed project.

Your submission may be to produce a proposed project, as in previous years, that touches any socially significant topic, especially climate change. We also encourage you to consider submitting work related to the two tragedies that have dramatically affected many lives this year in particular: the pandemic and all that has resulted from the killing of George Floyd. Our impression is that many people, especially students, have focused on producing work on these two topics this year and we want to recognize the importance and uniqueness of that work. These may be personal narratives or connect with the world outside your own.

The Alexia's mission is to support individual visual storytellers of all types; what storytellers address and what they say about life on the planet is more important than the genre chosen to address that topic. Your submission must include a set of still photographs; you may also submit other media expressed in varying story forms as part of your grant application submission. Other media may include audio, video, VR or any other visual format. There will be a spot on the submission site to post up to two links that present media other than still photos.

Bugs

Did you know that all bugs are insects but not all insects are bugs? Insects have more species than any other group of animals and are subdivided into many major "orders" which is a term in the science of taxonomy. The true bugs are in the order Hemiptera. They are great subjects for macro photography. Like most insects they have the usual three body parts: head, thorax and abdomen. They have the usual two pair of wings attached to the thorax as well as the three pair of legs. Different orders are then grouped by the type of mouth parts and the development from egg



to adult. Bugs begin as an egg and then grow and develop into adults in a series of molts, gradually developing the wings for flight as adults. The most interesting part of these guys is the mouth apparatus, which is designed for piercing and then sucking. It consist of a long tube of two parts. The larger tube is designed for cutting into plant or animal tissue. The smaller part, usually a part of the larger tube, works like a straw to suck up the fluids of the victim. The tissue was liquefied when the bug injected powerful enzymes.

You all know about many of these more familiar bugs and most likely photographed many of them. Perhaps the stinkbug, squash bug, or maybe the water strider or even the assassin bug. The orange and black box elder bug may have invaded your home in the late fall looking for a place to over winter.



This year because of the pandemic, my travels have been to my yard and occasionally to a nearby park where I can photograph and be completely alone. I share my project to document the life of a single species of bug — the Large Milkweed Bug. They began to feed on my butterfly bush (related to milkweeds) with similar toxins. Thus they also advertise their harmful effect to potential predators, mimicking the monarch butterfly, with black and orange coloration. I was not concerned about the damage to the plant because they feed upon the seed pods only near the outside layer of seeds leaving most intact for seed dispersal.

The images reveal the tiny beginning of the first stage nymph about one mm in length to mating adults. In the photographs you can see the piercing sucking mouth parts, the larger piercing and the smaller sucking part. You can visualize the wing buds growing larger and some of the adults. All images taken out side with a macro 200mm lens and tripod. For many, I used a Cannon diopter screwed onto the macro lens. ISO 100 for many and no more than 800 on cloudy or windy days. Early morning was best because just after sunrise the air is usually quite still. When I had a busy background I would hold a piece of black velvet behind or an out of focus greenish mat photograph mounted on foam core. Most f stops were between 16 to 40.

<u>Searching for Green Tree Frogs</u> By Patrcia Deege

August 2020

Recently I joined a group to photograph at Neabsco Creek Regional Park near Dale City. The ¾ mile boardwalk crosses a marshy wilderness which, if one looks closely, is filled with a myriad of fascinating wildlife. That day we were hunting for the little green tree frogs. They are tiny, mostly one inch long or less, and have sticky pads on their feet, similar to the poison dart frogs in South America, which enables them to cling onto very upright perches. At first they seem hard to find, until one's eye becomes accustomed to their size, shape and coloring.

These frogs prefer cool shady places and tend to hide when the sun gets high. They live in urban areas, forests, woodlands, wetlands and heath. They also have a habit of taking up residence in and around

suburban houses, in drain pipes, water tanks, letterboxes and apparently even in toilet bowls. We found dozens of them in many different poses and they obligingly sat very still for the camera. When one suddenly hopped away I was too surprised to catch the action.

There was also a host of different insects, a few butterflies and birds and even a snake. It was a great way to spend a morning with the camera; quite a lot of people but easy to practice social distancing and still find interesting subjects to photograph.


