ANNUAL DUES

Members also voted affirmatively to raise the annual dues starting in the 2018-2019 program year as follows.

	Full year (if paid between July 1- Dec. 31)	Half year (if paid after Jan. 1)
Single member	\$45	\$22.50
Family membership	\$65	\$32.50

The Board recommended increasing the dues for the following reasons:

Decrease in our membership base. We have a net loss of members from 2016-17 to 2017-18. We had nearly 100 members in the former year, but only 82 members this current program year. This may be the result of demographic changes, with people of a retirement age leaving the area. We hope that by promoting the club via Meetup and other means, we can make up the difference.

Inflation. The cost of doing business has increased.

PayPal. In hopes of bringing in more members and in making it easier for existing members to pay their dues, the Board voted to allow members to pay their annual dues via PayPal for the 2018-2019 program year. The cost to VPS to use PayPal, however, is \$.30 per transaction plus 2.9% of the transaction amount. This means that for a single full year membership, which is by far the norm, the cost to the club for a \$45 membership it would be \$1.61. This means that the club would increase its income for 2018-2019 by \$3.39 per membership. If the number of full time single memberships is around 70, which would net the club an additional \$237.

Aging equipment. The club owns two projectors and two laptops that we use for speakers and competitions. Each piece of equipment is on a three-year replacement cycle to keep us up to date with the best equipment to display our images and the images of our speakers. This is considered good business practice. We therefore have to bank \$500 per year to have the funds available to purchase existing equipment when its replacement period has arrived. Because of a decreased membership base, we were unable to put away the \$500 in 2017-18 from existing revenue. Our income just about equaled our expenses. Instead we tapped into our reserves. While this may be acceptable as a short-term strategy, it will be detrimental to the club in the long term.

For these reasons the Board recommended that the membership agree to an increase in the dues.



Portfolio Project

In mid-June, members received an email from me assessing member interest in doing a portfolio project during the 2018-2019 club year. We received about a dozen responses, enough to proceed.

So, if you've been on the fence, be assured you'll be in good company, and let me know you're interested. Then we can get started over the summer. To summarize that earlier email:

- ◆ Our definition of a portfolio is broad: a collection of images that is representative of the photographer's work. This means that you get to specify the criteria by which you select the images for your portfolio. You can base your portfolio on the subject matter, as is commonly done, or try something different; for instance, you might create a calendar or counting book, or an ABC book, illustrate or tell a story, make a statement, or follow a subject in time.
- ◆ We will find ways to help one another, review progress, make suggestions for improvement, and share our finished work, during a VPS time slot, or online. Online resources are also available, and were listed in the earlier email.
- ◆ This is not a competition; you are the best judge of how well you met your objective.

If you're interested in doing a portfolio this coming year, contact me through the VPS site or at mhfriedm AT gwu DOT edu. Think about what you might do. Somewhere around mid-July, we can start to work out the mechanics of helping one another, sharing ideas, and showing our work.

Story-telling Images are Favored in PSA Nature

PSA Nature rules specify that "The story telling value of a photograph must be weighed more than the pictorial quality while maintaining high technical quality." What exactly is meant by "story telling?" Look for an image that goes beyond a pretty picture but also depicts something about the forces of nature or the life of an animal or plant. This may include a wide view of the Grand Canyon with the Snake River, a starfish at low tide, an animal with prey or wildflowers blooming in a field. The technical factors are still critical, i.e., the image must be in focus with proper exposure but it need not necessarily be a "pretty" picture. Pictorial quality includes composition, quality of lighting, and impact. Pictorial quality will certainly help an image but if the nature story is strong and compelling it may still be very successful without strong pictorial qualities. So when you go out and photograph, think about the nature story you are trying to tell. Figure out which camera settings, accessories, and lens make the most sense for what you are trying to photograph. Finally, learn about your subject and this will help you tell the story.

I suggested exit 150. Closed my eyes for a few minutes realized we missed exit 150. So, we get off of exit 160. It's a tourist trap strip mall, but a nice one. I fell in love with a leather cowboy hat and went to pay for it at the counter. There I saw the place I wanted to see on a post card. Now I'm thinking it has to be hundreds of miles from here. So, I asked the sales lady if she knew how far it was from here. With a smile on her face she said "Less than two miles."

Went to get something eat. After eating my bison burger. I was like a little kid. We need to go now as if it may not be there if we didn't leave soon.

When we arrived. For me. It was more than I expected. It was a 50 foot statue of a female Native American Indian titled "Dignity." It is off of route 90, near Chamberlain, SD.

National Geographic Trip

We recently came back from a National Geographic trip to Morocco. It was 12 days long and covered Casablanca, Marrakech, the High Atlas Mountains, the old caravan routes, plus we spent the night in a Berber Tent Camp in the Sahara, rode camels at sunset, then went on to Fes, Meknes and the Roman ruins at Volubilis. It was quite a trek.

Before I go on trips like this I try to set goals for what I want to shoot. For Morocco, it was people, but I found out just before we left that taking photos of people in Morocco is very difficult. Why? They just don't like to have their picture taken. Here are some of the reactions you'll get, even from little kids:

- Turn their head or cover it with a scarf (women)
- Walk away
- Shake their head at you with stern look
- Use their hands to indicate no, often with a lot of emotion
- If subject in a "Tourist" area and in native costume you may be able to take a picture for free, or more likely you'll need to negotiate a price
- Or some combination of the above

So I had to come up with strategies to overcome these obstacles. I started with some tips from Bob Krist (Nat Geo photographer), his book titled "101 Tips for Travel Photographers" has a page on how to take "Hip Shots" so that the subject doesn't know they are being photographed. I practiced this a bit before we went, and for reasons you'll read later in this piece, had limited success.

I broke the "task" down to three different areas where different techniques were necessary:

- While on the moving bus
- While in tight quarters like the Souks (markets) inside the old cities, or Medinas
- When you didn't have either of these constraints

MOVING BUS PHOTOGRAPHY

We spent a fair bit of time on the bus since we covered a lot of this country. I was never bored because I sat in the back and had plenty of space to roam since the bus wasn't full. Here are some of the challenges for taking pictures from the bus – and how to deal with them:

Window Reflections. You'll get more of these when the sun is on your side, so I would always move to the other side of the bus unless the sun was low on the horizon or well ahead or behind the scene I was shooting. If you have someone sitting in front of you with light colored clothing, that will present a reflection problem (and so will your clothing), so adjust your position or clothing.

Bus speed and shooting from an unstable platform. I set my shutter speed 1/1000 sec and just let the aperture and ISO follow. Use the highest burst mode you can – you will use up your SD cards fairly quickly so make sure you have enough.



Subject anticipation. This is the most difficult thing to "Master". Depending on how close the subject is the bus (and the bus speed), you probably have 2-4 seconds from the time you've identified a "target" until the opportunity passes. Assuming you have a telephoto lens on your camera, you have two choices. Either preset the focal length, or adjust it as you see what you want to photograph. The right choice

depends on the speed of the bus, most of the time I chose to set the focal length in advance. So if I saw a village coming up with dwellings that were close the road (and the people might be very close to the bus) I might set the camera to 50mm or less. If the buildings and inhabitants were further away, say 50 yards or more, I would set my focal length to 135-200mm (or more depending on the camera I was using).

Major Tip. Don't try to follow the subject with your eye glued to the viewfinder. Pick a camera angle, orientation, depress for pre focus and hold and wait for the subject to show up.

Be prepared to play with some green tint in post processing.

I think my ultimate success rate was 10-20 percent for shots from the bus – not great, but it certainly made the time pass quickly! Here are some examples.

SHOOTING PEOPLE IN TIGHT QUARTERS

There are a bewildering number of opportunities the old Medina's and local markets of Morocco. These places are chaotic and filled with people, donkeys, and motorbikes. In some alleys there is only room for a loaded donkey to get by.

You can try the "hip shot" approach Bob Krist recommends. This involves manual settings for focus, aperture, and focal length, then holding the camera low so it's not obvious what you're doing. I had limited success here, since you need to have your subject fit into the "envelope" of what those settings were, and there was just too much chaos for this to be effective.

I had more success using my IPhone. Why? The people seemed to be more tolerant of having their picture taken with an IPhone – I don't know if they didn't recognize that it was a camera, or it simply wasn't as threatening as a large SLR. That doesn't mean I didn't get any of the above behaviors, but I just didn't get as many.

If you're going to use your phone, make sure you know what buttons will activate your camera, some buttons allow for much easier "one-handed" use. And you can almost make it look like you're having a conversation with someone on your phone (instead of taking a picture).



SHOOTING PEOPLE IN MORE OPEN AREAS AND FROM THE STATIONARY BUS

Obviously, use your telephoto lens. You may still get very negative reactions if they see what you're doing (but at least they won't be in your face). You may still have to "hide" a little so they don't know you're there, they are always watching tourists to see if they have their dreaded camera's out and pointed towards them.

Here is an image taken with the hip-shot technique.

Cameras I used: Fujifilm X-T2 with 18-55mm and 55-200mm lenses, Canon SX60HS superzoom, and iPhone 6.

Morocco is a fabulous place for photography, I highly recommend you put it on your bucket list!
