President's Report

PayPal is Coming!

Summary of 4/11/18 Board meeting: VPS's board meets about every other month. The Board is committed to maintaining a high level of programming for its members. The Board strives to be transparent in its decision-making and to listen thoughtfully to the voice of the membership. Here is a brief summary of Board decisions and initiatives. Please feel free to ask any of the Board members about these issues.

PayPal is coming

To attract more members and to make it easier for everyone to pay their annual dues, the Board decided to allow everyone to pay online using PayPal. You can also still write a paper check. To cover PayPal's costs, the Board voted to increase annual membership dues by \$5. So in the 2018-19 program year, the dues is \$45 for individuals, \$65 for family, \$22.50 for half-year individuals, and \$32.50 for half-year family.

Monitors for Competitions

As part of our transition from Oakton Elementary School back to Thoreau Middle School, we have struggled to find a room with low levels of ambient light so your photos look as good as they do on your home computers. Our solution is to acquire (for free from John Naman) a computer monitor. On competition night, the judges will make their determinations based on what they see on the monitor, not on the projected screen images. Members will still be able to view photos on the projected large screen. We tried this new procedure at two recent competitions and it appeared to be working well. David Heagy will provide everyone with the calibration settings from the competition monitor so we can calibrate our home computer screens to match.

Nominations are open

Each year on June 30, all of the club's officers' terms of office expire. We are very fortunate that many of them current officers have agreed to serve a second year. We do, however, have these vacancies to fill: First Vice President, Treasurer, Secretary, Judges, Forums, Exhibits, and Program Operations. As you know, we are a volunteer organization that depends entirely on our members to help run VPS's programs. Please talk with any of the current officers about what is involved in these positions and be willing to step up. We need you!

Annual membership survey

Your opinion is very important to the Board. Please take about five minutes to respond to the annual membership survey. The SurveyMonkey link was emailed to members. This helps the Board learn which programs work for you and to identify areas where we can improve.

Charging for Meetup

VPS posts its meetings and field trips on Meetup. Members of Meetup can choose to "follow" us, which means that Meetup pushes an announcement of a VPS meeting to our "followers." The Board agreed to consider charging people a nominal fee of up to \$5 per year to "follow" VPS activities. We have 1,389 "followers."

Field Reports: Meadowlark Botanical Gardens

My husband, Pat, and I arrived at 6 a.m. and photographed the lake and gazebo just before sunrise. I used a polarizer and did a fivesecond exposure to smooth out the rough water. Then Pat and I went to help Tom Stovall set up for his lecture in the Visitor Center. Tom's lecture was great and we had a good turnout. At least 15 members attended. Tom explained why he

likes to shoot raw files, in manual mode with "back button" focus. He talked about what he likes to photograph at Meadowlark and places to find them, including foxes, green herons, and bluebirds. He also gave tips on local places to photograph subjects including a northern shrike (Centreville), hummingbirds (Green Spring Gardens), great blue herons (Great Falls National Park in Maryland versus the Virginia side) and hooded mergansers (Huntley Meadows). His images of wildlife and the gardens were outstanding. He reviewed more than a dozen images sent in by members and revealed how he would process them in Lightroom with before and after images. I am greatly appreciative of Tom's willingness to educate us about nature photography. Thank you, Tom!

EDITOR'S NOTE: VPS members visited Meadowlark Botanical Gardens on April 15. Kathrin Swoboda arranged for the garden's Resident Photographer Tom Stovall to lead a workshop. This was a combination field trip and the first event for "Nature Lovers," VPS's new interest group to promote nature photography at all levels for all Northern Virginians. Who knew? Who knew that the most valuable lesson I'd learn at our first "Nature Lovers" outing was a lesson in *PROCESSING* my photos instead of shooting them? Tom Stovall taught us to start processing in Lightroom by moving the highlight slider all the way to the left and the shadow slider all the way to the right -- and then tweaking the other settings as needed. Just that simple tip has worked miracles on many of my favorite photos. The pic to the left is neither a miraculous work of art nor my fav photo-- but it *is* one of my favorite subjects: *bugs!*

Rating Photo Workshops

I've attended many local and out-of-town photo classes, lectures, and workshops over the past few years. I rated some of them from five-star to two-star to help members chose outings they might like.

Would I go with her again? Absolutely! She is very nice, very knowledgeable, and goes to incredible places!

I have taken four of her workshops: Smoky Mountain National Park, Death Valley National Park, the Oregon Coast, and Valley of Fire/Antelope Canyon. Jennifer is a professional landscape photographer who specializes in the national parks.

Each workshop lasted four days. You arrive on Sunday to gather for dinner and conclude on Thursday afternoon.

The routine: Typically we got up well before dawn and travelled to the first location. We shot from dawn to about 9:30 a.m. We returned to town for breakfast and a nap. In mid-afternoon, Jennifer or her husband conducted a Lightroom/Photoshop session. We went out again about an hour before dusk to shoot sunset or stars.

Locations: The parks were fantastic if you like outdoor photography. Jennifer's expertise is getting you to the right spots within the park at the right time of day. She has alternate plans if the weather is bad.

Instruction: Jennifer and her assistants (one is her husband), will give you as much or as little help as you wish. I learn at least one or more new techniques or compositional approaches on every trip I take with her and I've been on 4 trips.

Cost: \$1,500 for your first trip and \$1,350 for each trip after the first one. This just covers her fee. You still need to pay for your meals, hotel, airfare, and rental car. I figure one of her trips costs about \$3,000.

OUT OF TOWN WORKSHOP: Would I go with him again? Most definitely!

I went on a three-day workshop with him to Charleston, SC.

The routine: Typically we got up well before dawn and travelled to the first location. We shot from dawn to about 9:30 a.m. Then we went back to town for breakfast and a nap. In mid-afternoon, Corey provided excellent Lightroom and Photoshop tips. We went out again about an hour before dusk to shoot sunset.

Locations: I rate these very highly. The places we visited were incredible. They included plantations, beaches, in downtown Charleston, and an old cemetery.

Instruction: Corey is an excellent teacher. He helped us figure out composition in the field and had great lessons in Lightroom and Photoshop.

Cost: Can't remember.




LOCAL LIGHTROOM CLASS: Would I go with him again? Most definitely!

Cost: I think it is now \$149.

OUT OF TOWN WORKSHOP: Would I go with them again? Yes!


I attended a workshop in West Virginia to shoot Dolly Sods National Wilderness Area in the fall. I it was three days long.

The routine: Typically we got up well before dawn and travelled to the first location. We shot from dawn to about 9:30 a.m. Then we went back to town and had breakfast and then a nap. We went out again about an hour before dusk to shoot sunset.

Locations: Roadrunner found a number of great locations to shoot fall color and moving water.

Instruction: Don Rosenberger and Denise Silva were light on instruction.

Cost: Can't remember, but it was probably around \$1,000, exclusive of meals and hotel.


LOCAL WORKSHOP: Would I go with them again? Depends where.

Cost: I think they were both free.





Secrets to Photoshop Success

Before and After Photoshop

I have a confession to make: I enjoy photo processing more than I do taking photographs. Don't get me wrong, I spend more than I should on photography equipment, but I still derive a great deal of pleasure taking a so-so picture straight out of the camera and turning it into something special.

A year ago I was using Lightroom and did not know very much how to use the power of Photoshop. But in just a year's time, I humbly believe that I've surpassed many of the professionals that I see use and abuse post-processing methods. And yet there is still so much ground yet to cover.

So I am going to let you in on the secret, but you have to promise keep it within VPS. The secret is a photo processor in Brisbane, Australia who runs a sprawling website that contains the most useful information anywhere on what to do with a picture that comes straight out of your camera. His name is

Damien Symonds and the website is

You can bounce around the site to see what he lets the public see. But the goldmine of information lies in the classes. His approach is the most methodical I have seen anywhere. If you have an analytical mind you will be at home. The workflow he will have you using is Bridge, Adobe Camera Raw, and then Photoshop. Forget Lightroom. Really. The lessons are interactive, and he is unbelievably prompt with his critiques of your work. But you must always choose the premium version of a course if it's available. That allows you to post your work and receive comments from Damien. His eye for issues, mistakes, and corrections is something to behold.

The **Layers and Masks class** is a good beginning (or review) and sets the foundation for what follows. The Raw class will turn your existing knowledge of raw processing inside out and give you a true understanding of what Adobe Camera Raw is supposed to do and how to do it.

The **Levels class** will teach you how to quickly produce a "clean" picture. The idea here is that if you took the same raw file and ran it through Photoshop again years later, you would still end up with the same result; that is, a photo looking very similar, if not identical, to your previous Photoshop work. Once you produce a clean picture, you can play with artistic effects. It should be pointed out that Damien is admittedly not an artist or a great photographer, so you will not go in to great detail on special artistic effects. But he does cover how to correct most every problem that you might encounter (and many more of which you may not be aware).

Other classes that are invaluable are the **Sharpening class**, and the **Skin class** (with a great action for correcting casts and other color problems in skin). **Channel Mixer class** is interesting and covers things like glasses glare and moire correction. He's just added a Bridge class that I have not yet taken.

Road Scholar's Picture with a Pro:

Wildlife and Nature Photography on Virginia's Eastern Shore By Joan Axilbund

Jim Clark, a local professional photographer, leads a six-day workshop in Chincoteague for the most reasonable price around. The \$899 price includes lodging, meals, transportation, instruction, and best of all, a hot breakfast in the field for all sunrise shoots (which is every morning on the beach!). Jim is a natural teacher and, when you are not out shooting, you are in the classroom. In addition to wildlife photography there are visits to several of the local fishing villages in the vicinity. What is the

downside? The accommodations are in a field station so reminiscent of a dormitory. You do get a private room which is quite large but you may share a bathroom with another person. However, there are two toilets and two showers in the bathroom so it is only the room that is shared. The food at the field station is cafeteria food but there is a salad bar available. Most evening meals are at restaurants in Chincoteague.

I have done this workshop twice, as has Gloria Spellman. Mary Jane and Martin Fish have also attended. I have gone in the spring and fall and both times are fine.

Note that Nikhil Bahl, another local photographer, also is an instructor in the program -- I have not taken his course -- so you should verify with Road Scholar which instructor is leading the course for the week you select. According to Jim Clark's website, he is leading Oct. 21-26 and Nov. 9-14 but you should verify that before you register. The spring courses are currently wait-listed. For details, visit

If you're still in the dark about Lightroom, the class "Lightroom in a Day" taught by Corey Hilz of Capital Photography Center is a wonderful introduction to this powerful organizing and editing program. I was one of 12 students who participated in this hands-on class a few weeks ago and recommend it highly. You must have the correct version of Lightroom installed on your computer, so I finally took the leap and signed up for the Lightroom/Adobe yearly subscription and downloaded what I needed.

We arrived at the class about 15 minutes early so that we could download the images Corey would use to teach the functions of tools in the Library and Develop modules and be ready to officially start at 9 a.m. Being a teacher myself, I especially

appreciated Corey's organization, knowledge, ability to clarify complex concepts, and his patience. No question was left unanswered, and he stopped his presentation as needed to help those who needed it.

Both Corey and his presentation were outstanding, and I highly recommend taking this Capital Photography class "Lightroom in a Day." You won't be disappointed. If an introduction to Lightroom isn't what you need, visit the Capital Photography website for additional classes and instructors.

Tips on Portrait Photography

The best parts of being a photographer to me are creating tangible artifacts of emotion and the preservation of those individual glimpses. In photographs, you can live moments over again, savor details lost

and even include others in your memory with such rich visual reminders that they can imagine (or believe) they were there. My children never really knew my mother in the way I had hoped; she died when my oldest was an infant. But, we celebrate my mother's birthday every year. We sing, eat cake, and share the few pictures and many stories of her life. At one celebration, my heart was filled with joy when my youngest asked, "How old was I again, when your mom died?" At every forum, we'll try to have hands-on things to do/photograph and/or totally interactive, such as critiques. The format is intended to be 30 minutes each for:

- (1) novice (cell phone)
- (2) intermediate (compact-4/3rds cameras)
- (3) advanced (full-frame cameras)

Always try to bring a camera!

Schedule (Thoreau Middle School, 7:30 p.m.):

- May 23 Field Trip: sharing photos taken on VPS field trips and critique editing assignment
- May 30 Critique editing: results and discussion and make plans for next year

The May Forums are non-verbal critiquing of problematic images. Instead of saying, "You should crop here, do this, do that," the image will be online (soon) to fix up the way you think it should be. The fun comes when we get together and compare all the different ways we have to "fix" an image. This has been the most popular forum in past years. The problematic Images will be representative of monthly themes -- Abstracts, Black and White, Night Photography, Children and Animals in Motion, Photojournalism, Town of Vienna, Flowers -- so that we all have a chance to keep up our skills. Expensive software is NOT required. I will gather a list of web links to free software, some just apps on a phone, to let us do crop, straighten, lighten, darken, change color saturation, delete certain people from family wedding, etc. The basics.
