# Happy Birthday, Flickr! 13 years and 12.4 billion photos

Happy Birthday Flickr! You may be one of the world's largest photo sharing services, but you're only a gangly 13-year-old teenager. You made your



public debut on Feb. 10, 2004, the brainchild of web consultants (and then wife and husband) Caterina Fake and Stewart Butterfield. You started out as an online game developed by their tiny Canadian company called Ludicorp, but quickly morphed into a photo sharing, organizing, and storage site. In 2005, Yahoo bought you for roughly \$25 million. We hope

you don't fold if behemoth Verizon completes its deal to buy your 23-year-old Ma and Pa (Yahoo! Inc.) for \$4.83 billion this year. Will you still be there for us? Or will we have to flee to your competitors: Instagram, Smugmug, or others?

Before you grow up, you probably want to know how you got your misspelled name. Ben Cerveny, one of Ludicorp's 5 employees, dubbed you Flicker. The team tried to buy the Flicker.com domain for its web site, but apparently it belonged to the Flicker Beer

company. Then some cybersquatting investors nabbed it for peanuts. Yahoo fought a huge court battle with a Hong-Kong company and its Florida investors to win the Flicker.com domain in 2006. So, now wayward photographers who stumble



onto Flicker.com will actually reach Flickr.com. Yahoo told me that as of January 2017, 317 photos are uploaded to Flickr *every second*, or 27.5 million *every day*. You boast an *astronomical* 12.4 billion photos, which were posted by individuals, companies, museums, the National Archives, photo clubs, and others. And you just keep growing and growing, Birthday Boy -- or Girl!

# PHOTOGRAPHY COACHING — MY LIFE'S WORK

As a photography coach, I have taught thousands of photographers while leading more than 600 workshops. Throughout the life of my photo tour business, which includes workshops in Washington, DC; New Orleans; and New York City, attendees consistently give 98 percent approval ratings. In January 2015 I launched the weekly photography podcast, "Shutterbug Life." Through a series of discussions, expert interviews and photo challenges, the podcast inspires emerging and enthusiast photographers to be better photographers. The podcast grew out of monthly free webinars I conducted for four years. Webinar speakers have included: Sharon Farmer, former White House director of photography: Evelyn Hockstein, a "New York Times" international

photojournalist who showed her work from Israel and Kenya; Brandon Stanton, who has creates street portraits for the blog, "Humans of New York;" and Hannele Lahti, a travel photographer who contributes to "National Geographic."

#### I CAME BY IT HONESTLY

My dad taught himself photography when he was 15 on the beautiful little island of St. Kitts. At one point, he was the only photographer in his village. Dad says he generated steady income riding his bicycle from house to house taking pictures.

Nestled in that time was an eight-year stint as a photojournalist in the Army Reserves."

<u>Windows</u>: Images should depict an opening in a wall, door, roof of a building or vehicle that is fitted with glass or other transparent material in a frame to admit light or air and allow people to see through.

Town of Vienna: Visit Vienna's website to see what they usually pick for the calendar. Check out the Town of Vienna Calendar for Annual Town Events and History. Seasonal pictures are appropriate of events are good. Usually images in the horizontal direction are best for the calendar. Scenes must be within the town limits. Photos should give a good overview of the event. Whether a photo is a close-up or taken at a further distance, it must provide an indication in some way that the event/photo is in Vienna. He will have lighting and many objects that can be used to do still life, macros or abstracts, such as sea shells, sand, feathers, cut glassware, and artificial flowers. All kinds of everyday objects can work great, such as iewelry, paper, slinky, pens, nails, glassware, and even your favorite Lego man/woman minifig. # **My Favorite Photo**

### X-Rated: Beach Blanket Bingo For Birds

This photo may never win an award, but I cherish it because I captured it during my first visit to a natural island paradise that was **JFK**, **Jr.**'s "secret getaway." I ventured to isolated **Cumberland Island** for its 18 miles of pristine Atlantic Ocean beaches at Georgia's southern tip. (I'm a "wilderness" beach junkie.)

I visited alone. That might be a drawback on some trips, but it's almost necessary to shoot certain nature photos. And who else would have the patience it required? It took more than 30 minutes to reach the **hundreds of Brown Pelicans, Royal Terns, and Black Skimmers** huddled together on the broad, otherwise empty beach without scaring them away. I employed the "slowly walk 20 steps and



stop when I'm far away" and "slowly walk 3 steps and stop when I'm close" method. I photograph at each stop in case the critters are spooked before I get close enough. Also, going alone, I felt "one with nature." I hoped the birds sensed that and knew that I wasn't there to harm them. Or that could be just a silly case of anthropomorphizing.

On that late day in May, I never tired of seeing the clown-like **Brown Pelicans** with their dinosaur-sized throat pouches. I saw oodles of them when I was a kid, but then they all but disappeared for decades. Like Bald

Eagles, DDT caused their eggs to crack before their babies were born. In 2009, pelicans were removed from the Endangered Species list, two years after eagles rebounded. And seeing even a handful of **Black Skimmers** thrilled me when I spotted them in Delaware a few years before. These big black-and-white birds fly close to the water with their huge lower bills skimming the water for fish. They look like cartoon characters with their black eyes hidden in their black face feathers and their long, pointy black wings and long pointy orange-and-black beaks. But the **Royal Terns** were new to me. At the time, I was clueless about *what* they were -- I assumed they were juvenile Black Skimmers because they looked like younger cousins with black crested heads and long pointy orange beaks -- and what they were doing. But when I researched them on my computer later, I learned that they were performing elaborate courtship rituals. I hunkered down and watched them from 20 feet away as they performed strut-your-stuff dances, perched precariously to mate at the water's edge, and swooped down with a juicy fish or a plump shrimp to woo their mates. It was "Beach Blanket Bingo" for birds.

I was thrilled that these cute-as-kittens creatures accepted this lone human as their neighbor, if only for a couple of hours. They've long forgotten my presence but letting me get close enough to photograph them was their permanent present to me *and you*.

## **Columbia River Gorge**

Last June, my wife and I took a trip to the Pacific Northwest to attend my son's wedding. We arrived a week early and decided to see one of the country's really beautiful spots – the Columbia River Gorge.



The Columbia River forms the boundary between Oregon and Washington. The point at which it cuts through the Cascade Mountains is the gorge. The dramatic thing about the gorge is the number of spectacular waterfalls that drop from the mountainous high country down to the Columbia River. The area has been designated as a National Scenic Area.

The gorge is located about an hour east of Portland, OR. We stayed in a very nice resort called Skamania Lodge (<a href="https://www.destinationhotels.com/skamania">https://www.destinationhotels.com/skamania</a>), but more reasonably priced lodging can be had in the area. The waterfalls are nearly all located off a 20 mile stretch of US Route 30. There are plenty of turnoffs for each of the waterfalls, but parking is limited, so plan on going earlier in

the day and preferably a weekday.
We saw three terrific

waterfalls only a short walk from the parking lot (Horsetail, Multnomah, and Bridle veil Falls). We also hiked to several more. While you are in the area, take a day to visit Mount Hood, which is a spectacular volcanic peak that is maybe an hour from the gorge. Have fun and share your pix with us!



### **Shooting the Falls**

Here is what I recommend for getting great pictures of waterfalls.

- \* Use a tripod.
- \* Set the shutter speed on anything from .5 or .6 of a second to a full second. This gives the water a smooth silky look. Experiment with which setting gives you the look you prefer.
- \* Get something interesting in the foreground to lead your eye toward the waterfall, like rocks in the stream or pool.
- \* The ISO should be as low as you can get it to eliminate the most noise.
- \* Depending on the background, you probably want an aperture in F11-22 range to get a good depth of field. This will give you a smooth waterfall juxtaposed with a sharp foreground and perhaps some vegetation.

# **Focus Stacking**

At the beginning of January, our guest speaker, Corey Hilz, gave a terrific presentation on how to utilize a number of interesting techniques to give our images a different look and feel. In case you did not take notes on this one technique, I thought I would share them with you, as I have had some experience using it.

#### What is it anyway?

Focus stacking is a technique used to increase the depth of field in our images, so that the final image is very sharp front to back and side to side. It is accomplished by taking a number of identical images where you focus on different points on the subject and then combine them later in software. The end



result is an image that is much sharper throughout. In a way it is like using High Dynamic Range (HDR), where you take a number of images at different exposure settings and let the software determine the best exposure on each image to produce a final image of optimal exposure throughout.

You might reasonably ask: If I want to get a greater depth of field in my image, why not just decrease the size of the aperture (increase the f stop number)? So instead of shooting at say f2.8, shoot at f18, 20, or 32. Good point!

That of course will work nearly all of the time, but there are times when the situation will not give you the

depth of field that you may desire. For example, in a landscape, you might be very close to one object and yet you want, say those mountains in the distance to be in sharp focus as well. This can be accomplished by moving a little further from the closest object to get it just outside the hyper focal length that is consistent with the lens you are using. But that is another whole story!

Where focus stacking is most useful, however, is in macro photography. Whether you are using a macro lens, expansion tubes, or close focus filters, the closer you get to a subject, the depth of field decreases, even if you shoot at a high f stop. It's a matter of physics! What to do?

Here's where focus stacking can come to your rescue. The idea is to take a number of images of the same subject, while focusing on different parts of the subject. I usually start by taking a shot of the closest part of the image and then in successive images, work my way toward the back. In post processing the software will look for the sharpest lines in your series of images and mask those lines that are not sharp to produce the final image.

#### **Preliminary considerations**

Since the software will be looking for sharp edges, you need to be certain that the individual images are as sharp as you can make them. Conditions that might challenge you in this regard are, for example wind. If you are shooting a flower outside on a day with even a slight breeze, this can ruin your best efforts. Solutions include using a wind shield that eliminates the breeze around the subject or shooting the subject inside. Another tough one is shooting living subjects, because, well they tend to want to move around!

#### How do I go About it?

- Use a tripod don't move it or the subject!
- Compose the image.
- Use manual mode select ISO, shutter speed, & f stop must be same for all images in the sequence!
- Manually focus on an edge closest to the lens use live view & zoom button to get sharpest results.
- Follow the same procedure focusing a little deeper into the subject with each shot. Remember not to move either the camera or the subject!
- How many shots? Maybe 3 for a landscape, maybe 6-8 for a macro.

#### Processing the images in Lightroom (LR)

- Import images into LR as you normally would.
- Do not process the images in LR.
- Select all images you want to focus stack, then click Photo>edit in>open as layers in Photoshop (PS).

#### **Processing the Images in Photoshop (PS)**

- Select all of the layers (click on the top layer, then shift and click on the bottom layer).
- Click on Edit> auto align layers select auto leave the boxes for vignette removal and geometric distortion unchecked unless you see that problem in the images> OK.
- Then click on Edit> auto-blend layers select box for stack images and seamless tones & colors> OK
- Click on Layers> flatten image.
- You may now need to clean up any imperfections with the clone stamp.
- Close and save the image in whatever format you prefer.
- Now the image will return to LR.
- In LR process the image in the develop module as you would normally.

Remember to share your results with the rest of us!


